ROBERT THIELE

at the boundaries of the medium

The art of Robert Thiele, not exactly painting, nor exactly sculpture, fits into the cusp between the two means of expression. An independent of force and means, Thiele straddles boundaries with an eye to their ability to discuss the edges of meaning; the ghosted paintings emanating from a smooth surface—silk on glass or fiberglass—suggest hidden structures of richness. The work is extremely beautiful but never merely decorative; subtle forms make their way toward the viewer as from a great depth, as though to assert that the artist's struggle is primarily a search for an image that will not only please but will also assert a profundity of emotion and thought. The mostly minimalist influences and implications of Thiele's art work to center him within a tradition from which he takes freely yet does not imitate. Like the thought and art of Zen, the work stands on its own, self-sufficient and complete onto itself.

In contemporary art, perhaps the hardest goal to achieve is the balance between recognition of others and the expression of oneself—artists often, and too easily, stray into spaces in which influence is too clear or the expression is too forcefully individualistic. Just as Thiele works between the boundaries of his media, so does he effect a position that is in dialogue with his predecessors without succumbing either to imitation or hyperindividualism. This, then, is the grounding of his works' achievement, which attains reality and weight as constructed entities full of a metaphysical realism that impresses the audience as passing beyond the simple demands of the gesture. In an artworld full of the easily cynical, there is a genuine need for the kind of spirituality Thiele's art implies. Without it, the artistic impulse becomes jaded and commercialized—adjectives that too accurately describe much of what we see today.

Thiele's careful renditions of form are conditions of seeing; in the work *M-351*, for example, a red, vertically aligned rectangle is held in check by a circle surrounding it; this image is placed in the center of a rectangular relief. The effect is that of nearly archetypal meaning, the form asserting itself through a ghostly haze that at once accentuates and fogs over the image which we see. And in *M-348*, the viewer sees a cross on top of a mostly circular ground, which indents slightly on the right, letting the horizontal line of the cross break out beyond the edge of the ground. The combination of the simple geometric forms along with the sensuousness of the surface makes for pieces of understated beauty that catch the audience intuitively, nearly by surprise. In *Blued R. 98-04*, the image emerging is that of a single column, reminiscent of Brancusi, suggesting an endless verticality. The piece is more than a minimalist artifact; it is too lyrical to belong completely to an industrial process.

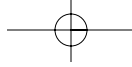
It is far from usual that we are exposed to subtlety and power in the same moment; this is the key to Thiele's art, which possesses a gravitas born of the brilliant handling of materials. Thiele has a wall in his studio that is covered with small works that engender a dialogue as if in conversation with each other. The echoing drama of the artist's work speaks to us with a passion that is recommended as much for a certain restraint as for its promulgation of energy; like much good art, the work appears to turn to paradox for its effect, although there is a unity to the pieces as well. Thiele's honesty is conveyed wordlessly to his audience, turning toward a content whose spiritual nature playfully contends with the boundaries of his medium and contemporary taste. His independence as an artist is a pleasure to see.

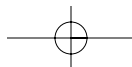

M-351, 2004, mixed media, 12 D. x 5 inches

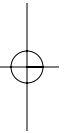
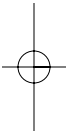
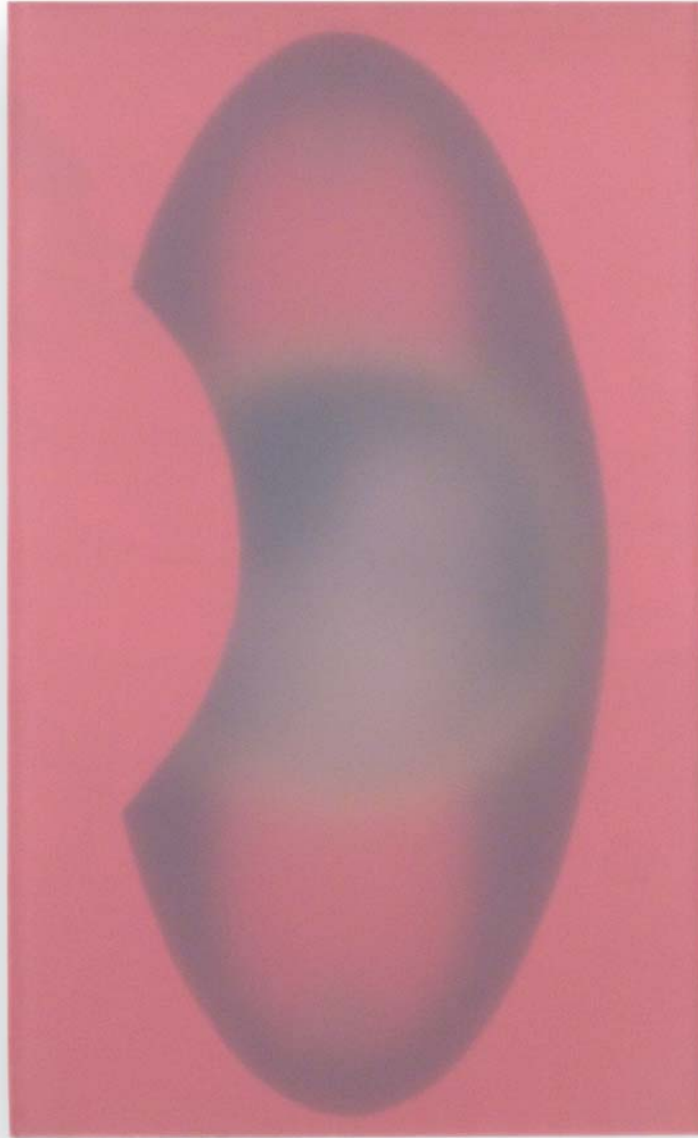
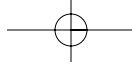




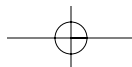
M-348, 2004, mixed media, 10 x 9 1/2 x 5 1/2 inches

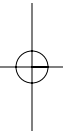
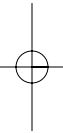
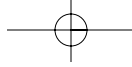


A-293, 2004, mixed media, 18 x 15 1/2 x 4 3/4 inches

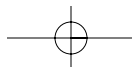


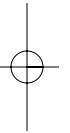
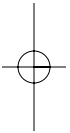
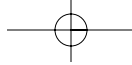

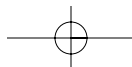
Blue M, 2004, mixed media, 11 x 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 inches

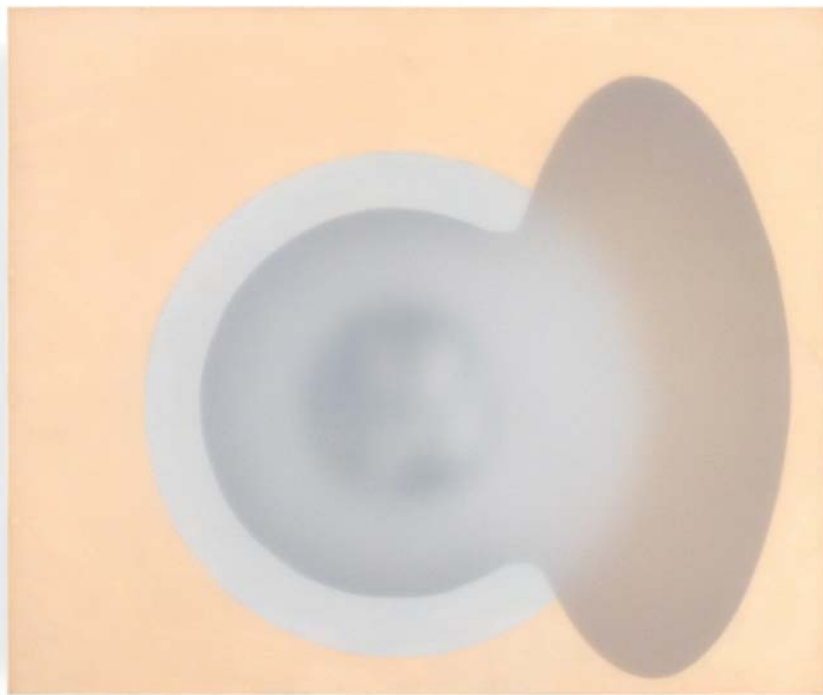




M-362 (left), 2004, mixed media, 36 x 24 x 4⁵/₈ inches

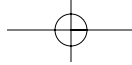
